SAFEGUARD ALL DRUGS AT HOME. LOCK THEM UP!

Lock up commonly abused medications in a secure and safe location.

WHY IS IT SO IMPORTANT TO SAFELY DISPOSE OF PRESCRIPTION DRUGS? TEENS

- 70% of people 12 and older who abuse prescription drugs get them from family and friends.
- 1 in 7 teens admitted to abusing prescription drugs to get high in the past year. Some 60% of teens who abused prescription pain relievers did so before the age of 15.
- 56% of teens believe that prescription drugs are easier to get than illicit drugs.
- 2 in 5 teens believe that prescription drugs are much safer than illegal drugs and 3 in 10 teens believe that prescription drugs are not addictive.
- 3.1 million 12 to 25 year olds used over the counter cough and cold medications at least once to get high. The mean age of the first nonprescribed use of sedatives and stimulants is 13.

ELDERS

 Helping elders clean out their medicine cabinets can help prevent accidental overdoses and the misappropriation of prescription drugs by personal care assistants or loved ones.
